

Yes. An **infinite feed** is much better than displaying 2,000 stories at once.

The professional approach is:

- Load first 50 stories.
- When user scrolls near the bottom, automatically load 50 more.
- Continue indefinitely.
- Insert a correspondent image every 20 stories.
- Much faster and uses less memory.

The easiest way to modify your existing page is to replace the display section with a paged feed.

### 1. Add near the top of your PHP

This transforms your current page into an **unlimited scrolling Reuters-style news feed**. As users scroll, additional stories are fetched from your cache automatically. Later, you can add the correspondent photos every 20 stories and even place banner ads or News1.net anchors between story blocks.
